What is Orientation & Mobility (O&M)?

Orientation & Mobility refers to knowing how to navigate one's position in time and space. It is the development of a specific skill set which, in turn, helps a child get from one place to another.


The importance of Orientation & Mobility:

Developing orientation & mobility skills allows children to orient themselves and travel as independently and safely as possible within their environments.

Things to do at home to enhance your child's orientation & mobility skills:

- Play games that increase body awareness (e.g., Simon Says, Hockey Pokey)
- Have your child help map furniture locations within your home
- Estimate then count steps from one location to another
- · Teach your child right and left directionality
- Ask questions regarding residential features (e.g., How many bedrooms/bathrooms can you locate? Which room is closest to the front door?)
- Have your child explain the path to a specific location. Include landmarks or identifying characteristics found along the path.
- Play sound identification games (e.g., I hear with my little ear...)

Picture Communication

Picture communication is universally designed to support everyone. It helps us understand even when we do not yet comprehend spoken or written language. Picture communication can be a bridge to learning spoken and written language. Click on each number below to learn more about each type of picture support.

PCS



PCS or Picture
Communication
Symbols are images that
represent language.
These are line drawings,
either coloured or black
/white and are a form of
symbolic
representation.

PECS



PECS or Picture
Exchange
Communication System
is a 6 phase AAC system
that first teaches a
person to give a single
PCS to a communication
partner in exchange for
a desired item or action.

PICS



PICS is short form for pictures. These include any pictures for communication including PCS (created with Meyer-Johnson software like Boardmaker).

Picture Symbols can:

- support attention / focus
- help us understand and remember what work or behavior is expected
- facilitate completion of multi-step tasks or activities
- support
 understanding of
 language (concepts,
 vocabulary,
 grammar, etc.)
- support expressive communication

Where can I see picture symbols?

- daily schedules
- behavioural support tools (first / then board, social stories)
- augmentative & alternative communication systems
- adapted books
- choice boards
- activity centres
- manufacturer assembly instructions
